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### Course Description

This course provides a comprehensive framework for analyzing how the economy actually works in an aggregate level. We will explore the details of both long term trends and short term fluctuations (business cycles) and explore the roles that consumers, firms, and governments play in the economy. Over the course of the semester we will cover long run growth, aggregate demand and supply, unemployment and wages, inflation, monetary and fiscal policy, as well as applying the tools of analysis to the recent recession. In addition, we will look at the microeconomic underpinnings of some of the theory. In the end you will have the technical tools necessary to intelligently read about and discuss current and past macroeconomic events.

### Prerequisites

1. ECON 1000 or ECON 2020 or equivalent from another institution
2. ECON 1078 and 1088, or MATH 1300, or MATH 1310, or MATH 1081, or MATH 1080, 1090 and 1100, or APPM 1350, or equivalent from another institution.

This course requires basic algebra (important) and calculus (especially derivatives). will be assumed that students possess these and there will be no formal math review.
