The course will use MacMillan Publishing's Achieve homework system that comes with an electronic version of the book embedded in the system. Achieve is where you will read your textbook and complete some graded assignments. You will access Achieve through our course website, Canvas.

Day 1 Digital Access in Canvas

Instructional Methodology and Delivery

5. Type of Assessments

These are open book and open note. There will be 14 Prep activities in total, and one Prep assignment with the lowest grade will be dropped from your nal grade calculation. 


Course grades will be determined by the completion of assignments, exams, and discussions, as shown below:
